
The Pankhurst Garden



THE PANKHURST GARDEN

Commemorating the hard work and dedication of the Suffragette movement – and all those who have bravely fought for women's equality.

The Pankhurst Garden pays tribute to the lengthy and gruesome battle fought by Emmeline Pankhurst and the Suffragettes, which gave ordinary women the independence to live their lives.

The Garden has been creatively designed by Janet Leigh to tell the story of the incredible women who won the vote, as well as offering a therapeutic space for the women and children who use Manchester Women's Aid, which is located at the Pankhurst Centre. It offers a living and breathing peaceful space within the city.

The design and structure is based on Edwardian knot gardens. The restrictions and confinements women were living and fighting against at that time are reflected in the structures of box hedging. The planting contained within these spaces is purple, white and green mirroring the colours adopted by the Suffragette movement: purple for dignity, white for purity, and green for hope. The plant varieties have also been selected to depict female names to remember the army of women who fought so hard for equality.

Red planting outside the Parlour window symbolizes the hardship, personal sacrifices and loss of life which the women endured as part of their fight for equality.

The bench design is based on Suffragette jewellery baring slogans of the movement and the arch is a replica of the parlour window, depicting the campaign moving from the parlour to the journey to parliament.

The Pankhurst Garden has been made possible thanks to hundreds of supporters of a crowdfunding campaign undertaken during the 2018 centenary of the first women achieving the right to vote in the UK – thank you to all of our contributors.
